Operational expenses are primarily covered by donations specified for operations, with small amounts occasionally required from funds directed to "wherever needed."

UKRAINE

More pastors...more ways to spread the **Good News**

• Seminary Training, Odessa, Ukraine (Project 1101) \$22,000

It's a joy to share the Good News. Teaching seminarian students to share the Good News and grow the church in Ukraine, as new pastors is such important work. CLMS provides the funding so the experience, knowledge and the in-depth understanding of our North American theologians can be shared at the Ukrainian seminary in Odessa. Rev. Albert Schmidt, from Edmonton, Alta., Dr. Norman Threinen of Summerland, B.C. and Dr. Jim Dimitroff of Saskatoon, Sask. are all part of the team that travels to Ukraine to help provide the training and guidance for these new pastors. We have the seminary, we have the professors...and now we have the books—praise the Lord, the **Lutheran Literature Project is** fully funded.

The young, new pastors in Ukraine are hungry for knowledge but the resources and books are not always available. This project made it possible to travel to the Lutheran Heritage Foundation warehouse in Russia to bring a quantity of materials to the seminary for distribution to the pastors.

Hearts are opened in the open air

• Summer Bible Camp (Project 1110) \$6,050

Each year two summer camp programs are held by the pastors in Ukraine for children and youth. The closeness to God and the focused time learning the Word has brought many young people to Christ.

The most vulnerable need so much help

• Orphans and Sick Children (Project 1106) \$2,420

Funds go a long way with those in so much need. This project covers the cost of craft supplies, food, medicine, and other costs involved for orphans to attend summer camp.

Orphans, Aged and Prisoners

(Project 1107) \$2,750

In Matthew 25:36. Jesus says, "I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." Matthew 25:40 "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." This project helps cover travel costs to the nine mission stations to provide literature, medicines and food.

Yearning for a place to worship

Construction of a Church, Pervomaisk (Project 1019) \$3.082

As the church in Ukraine is blessed with new Christians and new Lutherans, places to worship are in great need. The church construction started in 2009, continued in 2010 and will be completed in 2011.

NICARAGUA

Help put a smile on the faces of 1.000 children!

Vacation Bible School (Project 1102) \$6,000

Have you, your children, or grandchildren had the joy of attending Vacation Bible School (VBS)? This project shares that joy and the Good News message with 1.000 children, who with your help, can also attend VBS.

Opening the door so children have the chance to learn

Children's Christian Education (Project 1105) \$7,500

Families in Nicaragua often struggle to earn enough money to buy the essentials. Paying for school tuition at a cost of \$125 per year is out of reach for many

families. This project supports 60 to 100 children to attend school. Supporting those who provide help to others

• Deaconess Support (Project 1109) \$4,500 NOW FULLY **FUNDED**

Deaconesses in Nicaragua receive minimal support for the work which they do. This imposes a hardship on them, especially if they are single or must travel as they carry out their ministries. This project provides additional support to the deaconesses both monetary and through the delivery of necessary staples (rice, beans, etc.)

Finding a place to worship God

• New Mission Rent, Sabaco (Project 1112) \$1,200

After establishing congregations in the cities of Matagalpa and Jinotega, Missionary Hector Morales has now begun a new outreach program in other communities in the province of Matagalpa. A place for these new Christians to meet is very important. This project helps cover the cost of a building.

COSTA RICA

Making Christian learning available to many

• Rental of Facilities, Casa

Cuba (Project 1113) \$6,700

Rev. Edmundo Retana, a Costa Rica national and ordained Lutheran pastor, started his ministry in Cartago and now is reaching out in Casa Cuba. This project provides for the rental of facilities for worship and Christian education in both of these communities.

• Children's Christian **Education (Project 1105) \$7,500**

The work of the Lutheran Church in Costa Rica is under the supervision of Rev. Edmundo Retana, a Costa Rican national, who is replacing the informal children's programs with a formal program of Christian education in his country. Children will meet twice a week for three hours to learn Bible truth from the pastor, a deaconess and one assistant. This project will provide for 60 to 100 children attending these classes.

THAILAND

Home visits demonstrate the love of Christ.

• Missionary Rev. Suchat Chujit (Project 1104) \$8,500

Year after year, more and more Thai people are open to listen to the Gospel as Rev. Chujit visits in their homes and businesses. This project provides funding for Reverand Chujit's salary, benefits, and outreach materials for this mission in 2011.

CANADA

Where there is a will, it's important to find a way

• Van for a Mission to Oromos, Winnipeg (Project 1015) \$16,890

An immigrant group of Oromo people, in Winnipeg, finds strength in their new home through their Christian faith and worship. The challenge for the people in this special

community is finding a way to their place of worship. Getting to church is very difficult when most of the people do not own their own vehicles. This project pays for a van for transportation.

Supporting church families from around the globe

• Pastors with Alternative Training (PAT) Program, (Project 1108) \$16,673

Leaders in ethnic communities from Africa and other parts of the world are being trained as pastors to reach out with the Gospel to their own people in Canada. This project will provide for educational resources and other expenses related to the delivery of the program.

Where Needed

Many donors do not specify a particular project when they donate. These unspecified donations

account for 40 to 45 per cent of donations received each year. We really appreciate the faith shown by our donors in allowing us to apply those "Where Needed" funds to specific projects not fully funded by specified donations.

Operating Expenses

Even though CLMS is managed by a volunteer board and has no paid employees or paid fundraisers we still incur various operating expenses such as: an annual planning meeting, printing, postage and website maintenance. Most of the operating expenses are covered by donations from the volunteer board and a few supporters for these essential operating expenses for the continued operation of CLMS.
